LEA and Private School Plan

In February of each year Private School families are asked to complete the LEA's free/reduced price lunch application. Those applications are collected by the Private School and submitted to the Title I office. The Title I office works with the Food Service Department to certify eligibility. The Title I office then submits the names of eligible students to Zoning to determine the zoned school for each eligible student. During the application process the percentage of Title I eligible students attending private schools is determined and an equitable proportion of funds is calculated. The total funding determined through equitable proportion includes funds to support Parent & Family Engagement activities for Title I Private School families.
